<u>salm 42</u>

Many Hebrew manuscripts present Psalms 42 & 43 as one psalm, sharing a similar situation and theme, while ending with the same instruction.

Read both Psalms:

 From what is said in the psalms, what is the speaker's situation/context ie what is happening/has happened to the speaker?

Verse 1 & 2 set up two key ideas in these psalms: the desire for God and a sense of waiting.

- for most of us, a panting deer is a descriptive image rather than a reality. How do you understand this first verse?
- When have you thirsted for God? How did God deal with you?
- The use of 'when' in v2 implies having to wait. Where else in these psalms do you get a sense of waiting?
- Why does God cause us to wait? What is the value of waiting?
- The speaker in the psalms goes through a range of emotions and responses while waiting. What are these? How do you deal with waiting?

 Verse 7 give us a sense of the speaker being overwhelmed. What are some of the things that can overwhelm us in our lives today?
 How does the speaker deal with the sense of being overwhelmed? Which of the responses do you most relate to? Why?
 Throughout theses psalms we are given a number of titles and/or descriptions of God (v2; v4; v5; v8; v9). Look at these. What do they indicate about Him and/or His characteristics?
It can be helpful to reflect on the name/s by which we most often refer to God since the name/s we most often use indicates something of how we view Him and/or our relationship with Him. Think about the name/s you most use and what that indicates about your relationship with God.
The psalms end with a clear instruction. • What is it?
Why is the word 'yet' used in it?
Spend some time praying over the things that you have written/thought about.
